In the 1960's the Esb engineers decided that in order to ensure that the discharges from the Poolbeg Power Station were released above the inversion ceiling that develops over Dublin during anticyclonic weather in the Winter months they needed chimneys some 600 ft tall.

How then can it be safe to operate the proposed incinerator which has a chimney stack less than half that height.

(In conditions of inversion the plume from the incineractor would get trapped in the air over the city...giving rise to Very high concentration of pollutants.)
