

I have been asked by An Bord Pleanála to refer to the above appeal.



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FOYNES AND DISTRICT COMMUNITY COUNCIL

In 1983 the local Parish Hall was in need of extensive renovations to conform to fire regulations. This hall acted as a sports centre, social centre and meeting place for the community. It was agreed that the existing hall was too small for the needs of the community, and as a lot of money would need to be spent on mere renovations, it was decided to build a new centre with more facilities.

The people involved realised that this huge venture could not be undertaken without the support of the community.So Foynes village and the surrounding district was divided into electoral areas, and a council was democratically elected. Foynes and District Community Council held its first meeting (under the auspices of Muintir na Tire) in St,Senans Parish Hall on 10th of March 1987. The council had a mandate from the people to go ahead with the new centre.

The site - part of a field in the centre of the village - was purchased from the County Council for £1. (The rest of the field was ear-marked by the County Council for a town park.) As this site is on the Main Street, extra effort and cost was involved to ensure that the building blended into its surrounds. A firm of architects was employed. Much of the labour was done under the A.N.C.O. scheme. Of late we had to contract work (lighting, heating, ventillation, flooring ect.) A Planning Committee - a sub-committee of the Community Council- looked after what needed to be done in relation to the building. We were lucky to have people with the information and the skills to organise the project, and who made the time to ensure that everything was of the highest possible standard.

Of course finance was a major head-ache. An annual 800 Club was formed

This was our major means of fund-raising. Many other fund-raising projects were employed to swell the local contribution. Our contribution to date is £ 196951

The grants received to date total 2 30610

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The Centre consists of a main playing area (courts for basketball,volleyball,badminton and soft-ball);two squash courts;snooker room;a fullyfitted kitchen; showers and toilets. Tennis courts were provided bt the County Council at the back of the centre. A running track will surround the site.

Eventhough the building of the centre was our main project, we also got involved in other community projects. The out-door swimming pool, which had been closed for some years, was renovated and re-opened at a cost of $\frac{1}{15054}$

The Tidy Town Committee is a sub-committee of the Community Council. Foynes is in an area of great natural beauty. It also has a busy port, a thriving docks and many related industries. We are very fortunate that we are in this position, but business does create its own problems. It is the task of this committee to try to get the best out of both worlds.


