Dear Mr Meaney,

I refer to the above MEHL application and my submission no 65 dated 26 April 2012, in which I raised the question of the disposal of leachate from hazardous and non-hazardous cells containing principally chemicals emanating from incinerator ash originating at the Poolbeg (proposed) and Duleek(operating) facilities, totalling some 250,000 tons ash per annum. In particular I raised the question of the operation of the leachate drainage system after future closure of the facility and all pumps were switched off - in particular how was the rising head of leachate due to rainwater ingress to be controlled and disposed of.

At a meeting of Fingal County Council yesterday evening Monday 14th May, 2012 it became public knowldge how his technical problem was to be solved. The final three remaining options for the location of the sewage treatment plants for the Greater Dublin Drainage Scheme were announced i.e. Newtowncorduff, Annsbrook and Clonshaugh. It comes as no surprise to the Nevitt Lusk Action Group that the first two site options are conveniently located adjacent to, and down gradient of, the abandoned Nevitt site and the currently proposed MEHL site. Were the private company to obtain permission to discharge leachate into a public sewage plant at either of these first two mentioned locations hen the problem of leachate diposal would solved and passed on to the taxpayer.

I would now like to raise a for questions with the EPA in relation to this matter.

- Currently Dublin City Council has not obtained planning permission or an EPA license for the disposal of ash from the Poolbeg incinerator other than by exporting the material abroad.
- The MEHL EIS does not mention the fact that the cost of the infrastructure needed to dispose of their leachate is to be borne by the taxpayer.
- The MEHL EIS nor the Poolbeg EIS does not mention the fact that the only rational for the location of the sewage treatment plants at a remote site in North Fingal is to facilitate the disposal of incinerator ash for a private company.
- The MEHL EIS does not contain an Environmental Liability Risk Assessment (ELRA) which takes into account the cost to the public of providing a convenient sewage treatment plant capable of handling hazardous landfill leachate from the MEHL site.
- The MEHL EIS does not contain any details as to the proposed route of the necessary pipeline connecting the MEHL site with the sewage plant, who will construct this pipeline, and who will bear the cost, and were is the planning permission for such a development. The current EIS is therefore incomplete and defective on this most serious and essential element.
- Is the "drip-feeding" of essential elements of an EIS from separate quarters, after planning permission has been granted, acceptable practice to the EPA, and does it comply with the the EIA Directive and national legislation?
- No details are provided either in the Poolbeg or MEHL EIA process as to the construction details or cost of
 providing this major diversion of the sewage pipeline and treatment plant from the shorter Clonsaugh site to
 the north of the county, but it would be fair to say that it would be comparable to the cost of the new
 National Childrens Hospital, i.e. approx 500 Million Euro.
- And finally the NLAG would request the EPA as the technical experts and authorities in these matters to bring
 this very important issue to the attention of the Government, whom we feel sure are not aware of the
 additional financial implications of what is proposed, or the extent of the reliance of this private venture on
 the technical and/or financial cooperation and assistance of the four Greater Dublin Councils, the Department
 of Finance, an Bord Pleanala and the EPA.
