Dear sir,

I am writing with regard to the submissions made to An Bord Pleanala by Mr.Tom Philips and associates on August 31st and September 15th 2004 in relation to the proposed gas refinery at Ballinaboy Bridge, Co.Mayo.

Upon examining the documentation provided it is clear that most if not all that is being proposed in relation to matters of soil mechanics, movement of peat etc. is of an experimental nature and yet to be used in a development of the kind proposed.

My most serious concern is that of the stability of the proposed pipeline in the peat. The issue of how the pipeline will be secured into the peat is something that the applicants continually fail to address. This most basic of questions is one that has yet to be definitively answered.

The other major issue is the routing of the proposed pipeline so close to residential properties. The implications of this regarding health and safety raise serious concerns. The huge volume and pressure of the raw gas, water slugs, methanol, toxic materials as well other impurities it would be comparable to having a bomb in our front garden.

This type of development has not been done anywhere in the world. I refer to the report made by Mr. Kevin Moore of the need for a more comprehensive assessment of the situation.

I wish to make note of the fact that representatives of Shell Exploration and Production have been at allowed to use the planning system as a means of correcting the gross inadequacies and inaccuracies of their EIS submissions of the last 4 years. While I understand that the planning process is one that allows applicants the time to clarify submissions I firmly believe that in this case that time has been used by the applicant to conduct work that should have been conducted at the start of the process.

These would include the taking of peat samples, bore holes in Sruth Fada Conn estuary and surveys along the proposed route of the pipeline.

It is my opinion that had an independent EIS of the entire proposed development been commissioned we would have been presented with the true facts.

The area of the proposed development has been and should remain to be one with a pristine environment. The addition of the proposed development serves only to disrupt the delicate balance of the nature in the area.

The vast volume of traffic to be generated by the proposed development will disrupt the residents of this entire area in a most serious manner. Journeys to Belmullet or Castlebar would incur long delays; that is presuming that alternative routes are passable.

When all of the issues outlined above can still be of concern this late in the planning process then surely there is a simple conclusion.

My own conclusion is that this is quite simply the wrong type of development and that the site being proposed is the wrong one.
