Background

This application concerns the dredging and dumping of between 500,725 and 732,174 m³ sediment, annually for eight years¹. The original sampling and analysis plan (SAP) recommended thirteen samples within the harbour. A follow SAP added twelve samples for additional areas. One area could not be sampled due to coarse seabed in the area.

Discussion

The sediment quality is generally good, with the vast majority of samples classed as clean and just occasional exceedances of the lower guidance levels for zinc, copper, mercury, nickel and PAH². All other results are below lower guidance levels. areas considered contaminated.

Conclusion

The sediment quality is considered fairly good. The chemistry of the samples is much in line with results from previous sampling campaigns and would not preclude dumping at sea, in the absence of a feasible alternative.
