Dear Minister

I am to refer to your letter of 3rd March 2004 in relation to the waste licence application, which is before the Agency in respect of a proposed waste incinerator to be located in the Ringaskiddy area of Cork harbour. Your letter has been referred to me for reply.

As you are aware the Agency is in the process of examining and assessing this application with a view to determining whether to grant a licence for the facility or not.

Your letter is being taken as a submission in relation to this application having regard to the concerns of the residents as outlined in it.

The issue raised in your letter is one that the Agency will consider in the context of assessing the application. You will appreciate that the licensing process is a quasijudicial one, which the Agency must complete in accordance with the statutory provisions of the Waste Management Act and supporting licensing regulations. It is for this reason that the Agency cannot answer your query or express any views with regard to the licence application at this time.

I should like however to advise that the statutory provisions governing the licensing process are very clear in that the Agency cannot grant a licence unless it is satisfied with regard to a number of matters including, that the activity concerned will not cause environmental pollution.
