Ref: FCC "Application to the EPA for a Waste Licence" to operate a landfill at Nevitt, Lusk, Co Dublin.

Dear Sir or Madam

I wish to make an OBJECTION to the "Application for a Waste Licence", that Fingal County Council seeks for the proposed landfill at the Nevitt, Lusk. I live not more than 100meters from the buffer zone at the Nevitt cross and consider this as having a devastating effect on my family's life and the future lives of our young grandchildren.

Our current access to the N1 which we use everyday will be closed off and forcing us to use a longer route which will bring us straight into the heavy traffic and also to a junction on the N1 which is notorious for accidents at the moment which will only increase if more cars are forced to use it. With grandchildren in the car most times this is of great concern to us. Also time wise this route will add at least another fifteen minutes extra a day driving which is actually 1hr 15min extra a week on the school run only, this is not including going to and from work or daily chores!!!

The condition of our fresh Air that we are so accustom to will be destroyed by smell, dust, noxious fumes and gases regardless of what any report tells.

Noise is already increase dramatically in the past couple of years as we have to injure trucks going to and from **two landfills** already in our area!! McNally in Baldarragh and Murphy Environment both within walking distance from us. Murphy is both a landfill and quarry so we have trucks bringing building waste to the landfill and trucks bringing stone and gravel from the site which I may add is causing great concern as the speed on the road is getting out of control as it is now unsafe to go for a walk with fear of being hit by one of the lorries or by falling stones from the back of the trucks!!

Our beautiful landscape will be destroyed by this eyesore. And it has been discovered that ancient meeting place has been found on the Nevitt which should be protected and not destroyed by landfill. This is a significant part of our Irish history and is beyond me that anyone would give authorisation to just disregard it. The Nevitt wasn't called the nevitt for no reason!! It has a story to tell - PLEASE DON'T SILENCE IT BY THIS COVER UP!!!!!!!!!!
