ABOUT THIS APPLICATION FORM

This form is for the purpose of making an application for a Waste Water Discharge Licence under the Waste Water Discharge (Authorisation) Regulations, 2007 (S.I. No. 684 of 2007) or for the review of an existing Waste Water Discharge licence.

The Application Form **must** be completed in accordance with the instructions and guidance provided in the *Waste Water Discharge Licensing Application Guidance Note*. The Guidance Note gives an overview of Waste Water Licensing, outlines the licence application process (including the number of copies required) and specifies the information to be submitted as part of the application. The Guidance Note and application form are available to download from the Licensing page of the EPA's website at www.epa.ie.

A valid application for a Waste Water Discharge Licence must contain the information prescribed in the Waste Water Discharge (Authorisation) Regulations, 2007 (S.I. No. 684 of 2007). Regulation 16 of the Regulations sets out the statutory requirements for information to accompany a licence application. The application form is designed in such a way as to set out these questions in a structured manner and not necessarily in the order presented in the Regulations. In order to ensure a legally valid application in respect of Regulation 16 requirements, please complete the Regulation 16 Checklist provided in Annex 2.

This Application Form does not purport to be and should not be considered a legal interpretation of the provisions and requirements of the Waste Water Discharge (Authorisation) Regulations, 2007. While every effort has been made to ensure the accuracy of the material contained in the Application Form, the EPA assumes no responsibility and gives no guarantee, or warranty concerning the accuracy, completeness or up-to-date nature of the information provided herein and does not accept any liability whatsoever arising from any errors or omissions.

PROCEDURES

The procedure for making and processing of applications for waste water discharge licences, and for the processing of reviews of such licences, appear in the Waste Water Discharge (Authorisation) Regulations, 2007 (S.I. No. 684 of 2007) and is summarised below. The application fees that shall accompany an application are listed in the Third Schedule to the Regulations.

Prior to submitting an application the applicant must publish (within the two weeks prior to date of application) in a newspaper circulating in the area, and erect at the point nearest to the waste water treatment plant concerned or, if no such plant exists, at a location nearest the primary discharge point, a notice of intention to apply. An applicant, not being the local authority in whose functional area the relevant waste water discharge, or discharges, to which the relevant application relates, takes place or is to take place, must also notify the relevant Local Authority, in writing, of their intention to apply.

An application for a licence must be submitted on the appropriate form (available from the Agency) with the correct fee, and should contain relevant supporting documentation as attachments. The application should be based on responses to the form and include supporting written text and the appropriate use of tables and drawings. Where point source emissions occur, a system of unique reference numbers should be used to denote each discharge point. These should be simple, logical, and traceable throughout the application.

The application form is divided into a number of sections of related information. The purpose of these divisions is to facilitate both the applicant and the Agency in the provision of the information and its assessment. **Please adhere to the format as set out in the application form and clearly number each section and associated attachment, if applicable, accordingly.** Attachments should be clearly numbered, titled and paginated and must contain the required information as set out in the application form. Additional attachments may be included to supply any further information supporting the application. Any references made should be supported by a bibliography.

All questions should be answered. Where information is requested in the application form, which is not relevant to the particular application, the words "not applicable" should be clearly written on the form. The abbreviation "N/A" should not be used.

Additional information may need to be submitted beyond that which is explicitly requested on this form. Any references made should be supported by a bibliography. Non-Technical Summary

Killeagh is located approximately 10 kilometres west of Youghal and 14 kilometres east of Midleton and is situated on the N25 National Primary Route and former rail line connecting Youghal and Cork. The village has experienced substantial construction and population growth over the last number of years

The Waste Water Works and the activities carried out therein

Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) has a capacity to treat a maximum flow of 1000 PE. Currently the plant receives flows in excess of these figures, particularly during heavy rainfall where flows up to 2298m³/d have been recorded. Although the plant is hydraulically overloaded during heavy rainfall the plant still generally operates within its consents.

The Killeagh WWTP is required to treat the waste water that gravitates into the plant. Waste water from the village is collected in a combined sewer. The developer of a nearby residential development has built a pumping station inside the grounds of the waste water treatment boundary. Flows from this pumping station are pumped into a septic tank where all flows from the rest of the catchment enter the treatment works. Flows from this tank gravitate through an open channel flume with flow recorder and sampler into a Primary/sludge holding tank. Flows then gravitate into a submersible pumping station with 2 No. pumps, which lift the waste water into two Rotating Biological Contactors. Excess flows entering the pumping station are discharged to the Dissour River via the storm

water overflow. Waste water from the Rotating Biological Contactors then flows to 2 No. clarifiers for secondary treatment. The treated effluent then discharges down the final effluent line which contains a sampling unit.

Killeagh WWTP is currently operated by a private operator under a 10 year Operation and Maintenance Contract. The Service Provider is fully responsible for the provision of all plant, materials including consumables and labour and also including any licences and permits necessary to ensure that the facility is operated and maintained in accordance with best practice and any performance requirements stipulated in the Employer's Requirements.

Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plant is due to be upgraded to a 2,400 PE plant to ensure compliance with the relevant regulations. The improvements include the provision of:

- Wastewater Inlet
- Preliminary treatment
 - Screening
 - Grit removal

- Flow measurement, control and sampling
- Storm water storage
- Flow Splitting
- Primary settlement (optional)
- Secondary treatment (BOD and SS removal)
- Tertiary treatment
 - Phosphorus removal
 - Nitrogen removal

- Sampling of final effluent
- Effluent discharge
- Thickening and pumping of sludge (optional)
- Sludge storage
- Treatment of polluted ventilated air

This upgrade is currently under construction and is due for completion for mid 2009.

The sources of emissions from the waste water works

The population load for the Killeagh agglomeration arises from the following area:

- Domestic population
- Commercial premises
- School
- Tourism

The sewage from all commercial premises is collected via the public sewer and treated in conjunction with the domestic waste at the WWTP.

Other potential emissions from the waste water treatment plant include:

- Odour generated from the treatment process – there have been no recorded issues to date.
- Noise pollution – minor during normal operation. There have been no complaints regarding noise at the plant.

The nature and quantities of foreseeable emissions from the waste water works into the receiving aqueous environment as well as identification of significant effects of emissions on the environment.

The final effluent discharges to the River Dissour which runs parallel to the site. The flows to the existing plant is in the order of 304m³/d to 852m³/d with an average inflow of 478m³/d entering the plant per day. The new plant will be designed for 2,400 PE. The proposed upgrade of Killeagh WWTP will increase the capacity of the plant from 1,000 PE to 2,400 PE and discharge effluent to the River Dissour. The T.J. O'Connor & Associates Consulting Engineers Design & Build Works is included in **Attachment G.3**.

The proposed technology and other technologies for preventing or, where this is not possible, reducing emissions from the waste water works

Technology

The new WWTP will include the following elements:

- Inlet Screening including grit removal
- Storm Water Storage
- Primary settlement
- Secondary treatment
- Tertiary treatment

Techniques

The new WWTP shall be operated and maintained in accordance with the best practice and any performance requirements stipulated in the Employer's Requirements.

Further measures planned to comply with the general principle of the basic obligations of the operators, i.e., that no significant pollution is caused

Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plant is due to be upgraded to cater for 2,400 PE under the Water Services Investment Programme 2007-2009. Land has been obtained by Cork County Council adjacent to the existing site for the proposed WWTP. The new plant also includes Phosphorus and Nitrogen removal.

The upgrading of the plant will ensure that the basic obligations of the operator are being adhered to.

Measures planned to monitor emissions into the environment

The Cork County Council Environmental Laboratory carries out sampling of the influent and effluent. The Cork County Council Environmental Department located in Inniscarra takes samples from the river upstream and downstream of the wastewater treatment plant outfall.

The private operators also carry out sampling of the influent and effluent to ensure that the plant is operating satisfactorily.

The Cork County Council Planning Application Database identified a number of major developments, including one to contribute 181 units of residence. There was also a number of small developments. The total number of residential units to be granted planning permission is 325. The 325 additional residential locations, with an average of 2.9 persons per household, equates to a population of 943. Assuming the non-domestic contribution to be 15% of domestic, the non-domestic equates to 142 PE.

The waste water works will not be able to treat this additional load of 1085 PE under its current operation without posing an environmental risk. However with the scheduled upgrade works the treatment plant will be able to cater for this additional load, and future loads.

SECTION C: INFRASTRUCTURE & OPERATION

C.1 Operational Information Requirements

Killeagh is located approximately 10km west of Youghal and about 14km east of Middleton and is situated on the N25 National Primary route and former rail line connecting Youghal and Cork. The existing waste water treatment plant for Killeagh is designed for a population equivalent (PE) of 1000.

Inlet works

The waste water in Killeagh is collected in a partially combined foul and surface water drainage network and flows by gravity to the existing waste water treatment plant where it enters the septic tank. The developer of a nearby residential development has built a pumping station inside the WWTP boundary. Flows from this pumping station are pumped into a septic tank via two submersible pumps which operate on a duty/standby basis.

Primary/Sludge holding tank

The influent gravitates from the septic tank to an underground primary/sludge holding tank via an open flume which contains a flow recorder and sampler. Flows from the sludge holding tank gravitate towards the forward feed pumping station. The forward feed pumping station consists of two submersible pumps operating on a duty/standby basis.

Rotating Biological Contactors

Flows are pumped from the forward feed pumping station to the Rotating Biological Contactors (RBC). Here the influent is brought into contact with biological medium in order to remove pollutants. It consists of a series of closely spaced, parallel discs mounted on a rotating shaft which is supported just above the surface of the wastewater. Micro-organisms grow on the surface of the discs where biological degradation of the waste water takes place.

Clarifier

Waste water from the Rotating Biological Contactors gravitates to a splitter chamber where it is split between two static clarifiers to receive secondary treatment. The supernatant overflows the weir to discharge to the river via the final effluent pipe which contains a sampling unit. The pumps operate on a timer pumping sludge from the bottom of each clarifier. The sludge is returned to the forward feed pumping station and re-circulated through the treatment plant.

Proposed expansion

The Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plants DB Scheme will provide an upgraded & expanded WWTP for Killeagh village. The village has a census population of 575 persons at the 2006 Census. However, this is expected to rise considerably with one of the proposed developments to be constructed by Leahy Brothers providing 181 new dwellings in Killeagh. Other developments are proposed and it is expected that the treatment capacity required will rise to 2,400 PE in the coming five to ten years.

Due to the increasing load on the existing plant and the need to provide a satisfactory effluent quality, it is proposed to upgrade and expand the existing waste water treatment plant. The proposal is in accordance with the County Cork Development Plan 2003. This plant will be designed to serve a population equivalent of 2,400.

The final effluent will discharge from the upgraded/expanded treatment plant to the Dissour River which borders the site. The sludge produced at Killeagh WWTP will be transported by tanker or skip for further treatment at Midleton WWTP or a central hub sludge centre in accordance with the County Sludge Management Plan.

C.1.1 Storm Water Overflows

For each storm water overflow within the waste water works the following information shall be submitted:

- An assessment to determine compliance with the criteria for storm water overflows, as set out in the DoEHLG 'Procedures and Criteria in Relation to Storm Water Overflows', 1995 and any other guidance as may be specified by the Agency, and
- Identify whether any of the storm water overflows are to be decommissioned, and identify a date by which these overflows will cease, if applicable.

Storm Water Overflows

Excess flows entering the pump sump are discharged to the Dissour River via a 225mm concrete storm water discharge pipe. There is no information regarding the frequency of storm water overflows, or the quantities discharged.

There are no designated bathing waters, fresh fish areas or shellfish areas that are affected by the storm water overflow. Nor are there any downstream abstraction points intended for human consumption. Therefore the quality standards or objectives for the aquatic environment considered in the DoEHLG 'Procedures and Criteria in Relation to Storm Water Overflows' (1995) are not applicable to these storm water overflow.

This storm water overflow will be decommissioned on the completion of the new waste water treatment plant. The upgrade is due to be complete and operational by mid 2009.

C.1.2 Pumping Stations

For each pump station operating within the waste water works, provide details of the following:

Pumping Stations

There is one pumping station within the boundaries of the WWTP which pumps waste water from an adjacent housing development. The pumps activate when waste water can be pumped forward at a rate of 5m³/h, and can cater for up to 120m³/h. There is no emergency overflow provided in this pumping station to discharge waste water to the River Dissour in the event of a power failure. There is no storage capacity in the pumping station. There is no information regarding the frequency or duration of activation of emergency discharges to date.

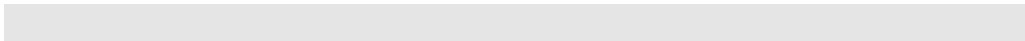

There are two discharge points from Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plant. The supernatant overflows the weir of the clarifier to discharge directly to the River Dissour via a 225mm open end, concrete final effluent pipe. The final effluent contains a sampling unit.

Excess flows entering the forward feed pump sump discharge directly to the River Dissour via a 225mm open end, concrete storm water overflow pipe. The passage of sewage through the septic tank will help in the removal of suspended solids in the storm water overflow. However there is very little biological activity and the removal of BOD is not significant.

The River Dissour, which is the receiving water body, is monitored in terms of the Freshwater Fish Directive, the Phosphorus Regulations by the Water laboratory of Cork County Council and in recent times the Water Framework Directive as part of the River Basin Project. It is proposed to continue this multi-faceted approach to monitoring the treatment plant and the impacts of the discharge to the receiving waters.

General Laboratory Information

The Wastewater Laboratory of Cork County Council is accredited for a number of analytical tests under the Irish National Accreditation Board (INAB) under the ISO 17025 international standard. The details of the Accreditation can be found

in Attachment E.2. The Wastewater Laboratory of Cork County Council is currently accredited for the following parameters under the ISO 17025 system:

- pH
- Biochemical Oxygen Demand
- Chemical Oxygen Demand
- Suspended Solids
- Ammonia
- Ortho Phosphates
- Total Phosphates
- Chloride
- Sulphate

The laboratory perform a number of analytical tests e.g. fats, oil , grease and metals using an ICP-OES system and while the Wastewater Laboratory of Cork County Council is not currently accredited for extra tests the same analytical procedures and protocol are adhered to by the laboratory as would be required if the tests were accredited. The laboratory also participates in proficiency testing schemes which measure the accuracy of the results and performance of the laboratory in both the EPA scheme and the WRC Aquacheck scheme from the UK. The performance of the laboratory in these schemes is excellent and the non-accredited tests are within the performance criteria for the schemes as evaluated by the scheme coordinators.

Receiving Water Body

The River Dissour rises approximately 0.5 km north of Killre flowing in a south-easterly direction passing through Killeagh and continuing on in the same direction for approximately 3 km before it reaches the Womanagh River confluence. The Dissour has a catchment area of 42 km² in spite of a relatively short main channel length of 13 km. The main channel of the Womanagh meets Youghal Bay at the southeast corner of the catchment. The Womanagh River becomes tidal at Finisk Bridge, immediately downstream of the Womanagh-Dissour confluence and 8km upstream of the bay. The lower stretches of the Womanagh are meandering and characterised by a soft substrate due to silt deposition. The river becomes estuarine near the shoreline.

The receiving water body of the Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plant is the Dissour River. The Dissour River is the main tributary of the Womanagh River. All effluent from the treatment plant discharges via the discharge point to the Dissour River.

Water Quality Standards

The Water Framework Directive (WFD) aims to establish an integrated approach to water protection, improvement and sustainable use. In order to achieve the requirements of the WFD, Ireland has been divided into a number of River Basin Districts. The South Western River Basin District (SWRBD) comprises substantially the counties of Cork and Kerry, all of Cork City, and also parts of counties Limerick, South Tipperary and Waterford.

Hydrometric Area 19 (Lee – Cork Harbour – Youghal Bay) is included in the SWRBD. The overall objectives of the SWRBD project include the following:

- Strengthen compliance with EU Directives and national legislation
- Collect and analyse information to determine water quality and identify possible threats to water status
- Prevent further deterioration and protect / enhance water quality
- Develop a programme of measures to address all significant pressures and sources of impact on aquatic ecosystems and groundwater
- Encourage and facilitate public participation including the maintenance of a project website
- Promote sustainable water use

In order to achieve these objectives the following project tasks have been identified:

- Identify pressures on water bodies and assess risk of not achieving compliance with the Water Framework Directive
- Prepare a Characterisation Report
- Identify Heavily Modified (HMWB) and Artificial Water Bodies (AWB)
- Establish data management system and GIS
- Prepare programme of measures
- Review of monitoring needs
- Design monitoring programme
- Prepare River Basin Management Strategy
- Assist public participation in the project

- Prepare printed reports
- Assist capacity building

The SWRBD have yet to set water quality standards for the River Dissour or the Womanagh River under a water quality or catchments management plan. The River Basin Management System currently being developed will include a programme of measures and a River Basin Management Strategy, designed to achieve at least good status for all waters by 2015, and to maintain high status where it exists.

Areas of Conservation

The Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government is responsible for the designation of conservation sites in Ireland. It is required under European law and national laws to conserve habitats and species, through designation of conservation areas under Special Areas of Conservation, Natural Heritage Areas and Special Protection Areas.

Special Areas of Conservation

Candidate Special Areas of Conservation (cSAC) are protected under the European Union (EU) Habitats Directive (92/43/EEC), as implemented in Ireland by the European Communities (Natural Habitats) Regulations, 1997.

The River Dissour does not flow through any Special Areas of Conservation. The lower stretches of the Womanagh River, from Clonpriest to the location where the river enters Youghal Bay is a designated Special Area of Conservation. This site's conservation value derives largely from the presence of a number of important coastal habitats listed in Annex I of the European Union Habitats Directive. The Ballymacoda (Clonpriest & Pillmore) Site Synopsis is included in **Attachment F.1.**

Natural Heritage Areas

The River Dissour and the Womanagh River do not flow through any Natural Heritage Areas (NHA). However the lower stretches of the Womanagh River, from Clonpriest to the location where the Womanagh River enters Youghal Bay is a proposed National Heritage Area. Under the Wildlife Amendment Act 2000, NHAs are legally protected from damage from the date they are formally proposed for designation.

National Heritage Areas are the basic designation for wildlife. An NHA is an area considered important for the habitats present or which holds species of plants and animals whose habitat needs protection.

Special Protection Areas

Special Protection Areas (SPAs) are designated in order to safeguard certain habitats pursuant to EU Directive requirements. The EU Birds Directive (79/409/EEC) requires designation of SPAs for listed rare and vulnerable species, migratory species and wetlands. The River Dissour does not flow through any Special Protection Areas. The lower stretches of the Womanagh River, from Clonpriest to the location where the Womanagh River enters Youghal Bay is a Special Protection Area.

Existing Receiving water

The 2005 EPA Water Quality Report indicated that the water quality in the River Dissour has remained satisfactory over the period of the last report. The biological water quality data for Station 0200 upstream of Killeagh village at a bridge west-southwest of Ballyre had a consistent Q4 value (unpolluted waters) since records began in 1971 to 2005. However the unpublished figures for the 2008 Phosphorus Implementation Report show a decreased value for station 0200 of Q3-4. Downstream of the village, at the bridge just upstream of the Womanagh confluence at station 0600, the biotic index-value has been recorded as Q4 for the past 5 sampling years, the recorded value for 2008 is Q3-4.

Surface Water Directive

The only surface water abstraction within the Womanagh catchment is on the Dower River at Dower. There are no discharges to this river, either upstream or downstream of its 2 km subterranean stretch. Consequently the provisions of the Surface Water Directive do not directly apply.

Groundwater Directives

The Groundwater Directives (80/778/EEC) does not apply, as there are no discharges to ground in the current operation.

Bathing Water Directive

The Bathing Water Regulations 1992 (SI No. 155 of 1992), lay down quality requirements for inland and coastal waters as designated bathing areas. There are no designated inland bathing areas in the Womanagh catchment nor are there any designated beaches on the Womanagh estuary. Consequently Directive 76/160/EEC does not directly apply.

Freshwater Fish Directive & Salmonid Regulations

Neither the Womanagh River nor its tributaries have been designated under the Regulations and it is not expected that they will be designated in the immediate future. Both the Womanagh and the Dissour are important fisheries for sea trout (*Salmo trutta*) and brown trout (*s. trutta*). Neither River has a large run of salmon (*S. salar*). Sea bass (*Dicentrarchus labrax*) have been caught in the Womanagh Estuary. Large shoals of grey mullet (*Chelon labrosus*) move upstream at high tide, while flatfish such as flounder (*Platichthys flesus*) also occur in the estuary. It has been suggested that smelt (*Osmerus eperlanus*) and/or shad (*Alosa sp.*) may be present in the catchment although no data is available.

EU Shellfish Waters Directive

EU Shellfish Waters Directive (79/923/EEC) on the quality required by shellfish waters, EU Directive on Health Conditions and the placing of Live Molluscs (91/67/EEC) and the associated Quality of Shellfish Waters Regulations 1994 (SI No. 200 of 1994) specify designated coastal and brackish waters needing protection or improvement in order to support shellfish. Specified limit values apply to these areas.

It must be noted that there is a Shellfish Designation in Youghal/Ballymacoda Bay where the Womanagh River discharges to the sea. The effluent from the plant should not affect the Shellfish Waters, due to a distance of approximately 11km from the discharge point to the designated area.

Urban Waste Water Treatment Directive

The Environmental Protection Agency Act 1992 (Urban Waste Water Treatment) Regulations 1994 (SI No. 419 of 1994) were issued to give effect to EU Directive (91/271/EEC) concerning urban waste water treatment. The regulations specify that waste water arising from populations of less than 2000 shall, by the end of 2005, be subject to appropriate treatment prior to discharge. Appropriate treatment is defined as:

...any process and/or disposal system which after discharge allows the receiving waters to meet the relevant provisions of the Directive and of other community Directives.

Relevant Community Directives are Directives 75/440/EEC, 78/160/EEC, 78/659/EEC and 79/923/EEC, all of which have been discussed above. Where the agglomeration served is over 2000PE (10000PE if coastal) the second schedule shall not exceed 25 mg/l and 35 mg/l respectively. The limits specified in the Urban Waste Water Treatment Directive are not considered onerous, and compliance with stricter articles of legislation such as the Fisheries Directive will ensure compliance with the Urban Waste Water Treatment Directive.

Phosphorus Regulations

The Local Government (Water Pollution) Act 1977 (Water Quality Standards for Phosphorus) Regulations 1998 (SI No. 258 of 1998) were introduced to counter eutrophication observed throughout Irish watercourses and also to comply with Council Directive 76/464/EEC on pollution caused by certain dangerous substances discharged into the aquatic environment.

The regulations oblige authorities to maintain or improve the quality at any part of a river by 2007 with reference to the Biological Quality Rating (Q value). The Q-values are shown in **Table F1.1**. The proposed upgrade of the waste water treatment plant should improve the Q-value rating downstream of the WWTP outfall. It should however be noted that the Q-value upstream of the outfall also has an unsatisfactory rating.

A Biological Quality Rating of Q4 represents satisfactory water quality. Eutrophication is unlikely to occur in water bodies with a biological quality rating of Q4 or higher. The Q-value of the Dissour is Q3-4, therefore there is a risk of eutrophication.

Water Framework Directive

EU Directive 2000/60/EC establishing a framework for community action in the field of water policy requires member states to restore the quality of their watercourses by 2015. Cork County Council has not previously adopted any plan with respect to the Womanagh Catchment.

On the basis of the above Table G.2.1 this site is not compliant with the Phosphorus Regulations (S.I. No. 258 of 1998). The treatment plant in Killeagh is due for upgrade under the Water Services Investment Programme 2007-2009. Nitrogen and phosphorus removal are to be included as part of the proposed upgrade.

On this basis it is expected that there will be an improvement in the Q rating due to this measure and other measures that were undertaken as part of a programme of measures and that the site will be in compliance with the Phosphorus Regulations at this location within the next two to three years. It should however be noted that site No 19W01 0200 which is upstream of the Killeagh Waste Water Treatment Plant outfall point is also non compliant with the Phosphorus Regulations.
