Hi Una,

This might be of use to you, although it is not required I asked our engineers in the UK to model the CCGT based on part load modeling (for internal/my own information), i.e. the plant operating at 50% & 60% of full load. Although our air dispersion modeling presented in the EIS and in the IPPCL revision application represents worst case scenario of 100% load it is sometimes useful to model at 50/60% to consider if there is any effect with a reduction in "velocity" in terms of dispersion/emissions. In reality the new plant will be guaranteed to be compatible with LCPD

directive and any other local legislation at such part-loads also the plant in Great Island is envisaged as a base-load plant and therefore will rarely operate at part load but in any case it is a worthwhile exercising modeling same.
